Instructions for Activating Your Online Subscription

All subscribers to the print edition of *The American Journal of Psychiatry* are automatically eligible to view the *Journal* online. The online version of the *Journal* allows you to conduct searches for topics of interest in issues going all the way back to 1844. Plus the only way readers can participate in the *Journal's* new CME Course program is to have an activated online subscription (note: there is an additional annual fee to be enrolled and eligible to receive up to 36 hours of category 1 CME credit).

Fill out all the information on the next screen and press the "Send Form" button at the bottom on the right.

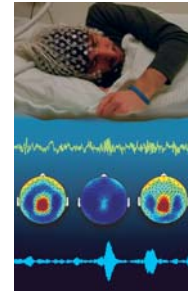

Ferrarelli et al. (p. 483) used high-density electroencephalography (hd-EEG) during sleep to study abnormalities in sleep-specific EEG rhythms. Schizophrenia subjects were found to have deficits in sleep spindles, bursts of EEG activity generated by the thalamic reticular nucleus in conjunction with specific thalamocortical structures. Low sleep spindle activity indicates dysfunction in these structures, which are involved in attention during waking. Six articles in this issue that examine new imaging techniques to identify abnormalities of brain activity in schizophrenia are discussed in the editorial by Freedman (p. 385).
