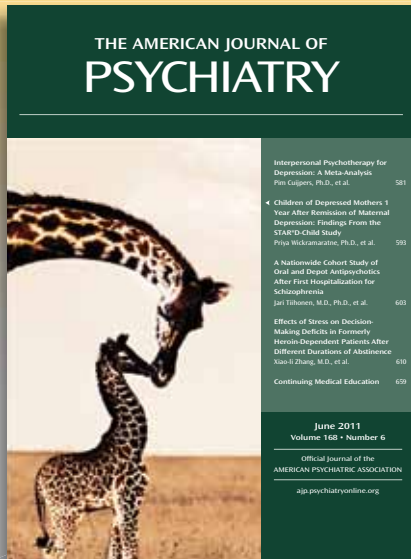

- The *American Journal of Psychiatry* has an impact factor of 12.759, a rise from last year's 12.522 and 2-point rise from the previous year's 10.545, according to the recently released 2010 Journal Citation Reports® (Thomson Reuters, 2011), placing it 2nd among the 126 journals in psychiatry journals indexed, while still remaining the far-and-away leader in total citations.

- *The American Journal of Psychiatry* (AJP) is also the #2 journal in psychiatry in terms of immediacy according to Thomson Scientific's Immediacy Index. This important performance metric

is calculated by dividing the number of citations to articles published in a given year by the number of articles published in that year.

- The Immediacy Index is a good measure of how quickly a given journal's articles are cited—AJP's #2 placement is a result of publishing articles that are relevant, covering current "hot" topics and cutting-edge research, and getting these findings to the field faster with AJP in Advance, the Journal's online-ahead-of-print publication protocol.

- A recent poll conducted by the BioMedical & Life Sciences Division of The Special Libraries Association identified the 100 most influential journals in all of Biology & Medicine over the last 100 years. *The American Journal of Psychiatry* was among those honored, the only psychiatry/psychology journal represented.

No other psychiatric journal reaches more psychiatrists with greater impact or immediacy than the journal that the overwhelming majority of psychiatrists considers essential: AJP.

Recent studies have demonstrated the involvement of psychological factors in the development of heart disease, with depressive illness and anxiety being linked to clinical cardiovascular events. Danny McDonald is an Australian artist who has been dealing with medical science as a subject for his work for over 20 years. Responding to his own family history of cardiac health, he established a residency in the Human Neurotransmitters Laboratory of Dr Gavin Lambert at The Baker IDI Heart & Diabetes Institute, Melbourne to explore the potential central nervous, physiological and genetic narrative. *Petit DEXA-Dan* derives from this intervention and functions as a portrait of the artist – a definition of self through data of various kinds – a 'research visage' highlighting the brain-heart nexus. Based on clinical tests this view from within provides new knowledge of his internal being, identity and materiality – a graphic image expressed in alternative vocabulary as to what he is rather than what he looks like.
