



Does a disrupted perception of motivational drive impair self-control in cocaine abusers? Goldstein et al. (p. 43) used fMRI to measure brain activation in subjects performing a forced-choice task under three monetary value conditions. Compared with healthy subjects, cocaine abusers demonstrated an overall reduced regional brain responsivity to differences of monetary value. Additionally, objective and subjective measures of motivation were not correlated, suggesting disrupted perception of their own drive.
