

- The American Journal of Psychiatry has an impact factor of 12.759, a rise from last year's 12.522 and 2-point rise from the previous year's 10.545, according to the recently released 2010 Journal Citation Reports® (Thomson Reuters, 2011), placing it 2nd among the 126 journals in psychiatry journals indexed, while still remaining the far-and-away leader in total citations.
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- A recent poll conducted by the BioMedical & Life Sciences Division of The Special Libraries Associaton identified the 100 most influential journals in all of Biology & Medicine over the last 100 years. The American Journal of Psychiatry was among those honored, the only psychiatry/ psychology journal represented.



Drawing produced under the influence of hashish (pen & ink on paper). Jean-Martin Charcot (1825–1893).

Jean-Martin Charcot was an eminent French neurologist, who is credited with delineating such conditions as disseminated sclerosis, amytrophic lateral sclerosis (Charcot's disease) and locomotor ataxia. He is best



known to a psychiatric audience for his work on hypnosis and hysteria, which, though now largely discredited, earned Charcot, in his day, the sobriquet, 'Napoleon of the neuroses'. His clinical lectures at the Salpêtrière Hospital in Paris were highly popular and were attended by Sigmund Freud, who drew on Charcot's ideas when developing his own theory of hysteria. In 1853, when Charcot was a medical student, he took hashish, which was in vogue in certain Bohemian and artistic circles in Paris during this period. He experienced 'a tumult of phantasmagoric visions' which he tried to capture in this sketch. Charcot was, in fact, a gifted draughtsman and took a great interest in the arts. He drew sketches of his patients and used photographs to illustrate clinical conditions.
