

- The American Journal of Psychiatry has an impact factor of 12.759, a rise from last year's 12.522 and 2-point rise from the previous year's 10.545, according to the recently released 2010 Journal Citation Reports® (Thomson Reuters, 2011), placing it 2nd among the 126 journals in psychiatry journals indexed, while still remaining the far-and-away leader in total citations.
- The American Journal of Psychiatry (AJP) is also the #2 journal in psychiatry in terms of immediacy according to Thomson Scientific's Immediacy Index. This important performance metric

is calculated by dividing the number of citations to articles published in a given year by the number of articles published in that year.

- The Immediacy Index is a good measure of how quickly a given journal's articles are cited—AJP's #2 placement is a result of publishing articles that are relevant, covering current "hot" topics and cutting-edge research, and getting these findings to the field faster with AJP in Advance, the Journal's online-ahead-of-print publication protocol.
- A recent poll conducted by the BioMedical & Life Sciences Division of The Special Libraries Associaton identified the 100 most influential journals in all of Biology & Medicine over the last 100 years. The American Journal of Psychiatry was among those honored, the only psychiatry/ psychology journal represented.

No other psychiatric journal reaches more psychiatrists with greater impact or immediacy than the journal that the overwhelming majority of psychiatrists considers essential: AJP.

### Cover picture

The Fairy Feller's Master-Stroke (c.1855-1864), detail. Richard Dadd (1817-1886)

When Richard Dadd was transferred from Bethlem Hospital to the newly opened Broadmoor in 1864, he had



to leave behind his not-quite-finished masterpiece, The Fairy Feiler's Master-Stroke. At Broadmoor he was soon at work at a water-colour version of the picture and by January 1865 had completed a rhymed description of its complex contents which he titled Elimination of a Picture. Here he identifies, among many other characters, the miniscule figures placed along the bizarrely elongated brim of the hat worn by the bearded "Patriarch" at the centre of the painting. On the left Mab, Queen of the Fairies and originator of wish-fulfilling dreams (according to Mercutio in Romeo and Juliet), is parked in her chariot along with its team of female centaurs – creatures perhaps inspired by King Lear's description of his treacherous daughters. To the right, a troupe of Spanish dancers process jauntily. Among them, Dadd talls us, is one dressed like Pauline Duvernay, whose cachucha he must have remembered from the London stage.
