75 years ago this month: "The Paucity of Arthritis Among Psychotic Cases"

Dr. Donald Gregg, on finding that "the incidence of disabling arthritis is 17 [times] greater in the community than among psychotics in Massachusetts State hospitals," speculates that because of impairments of imagination and memory, patients with psychosis may experience less muscular tension and localized ischemia than individuals without psychosis. In the discussion that follows, Dr. Karl A. Menninger suggests the possibility that human pathophysiology may be subject to a substitution effect—the "substitution of one clinical syndrome—psychiatric, clinical or whatever it is—for another."
