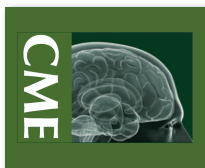

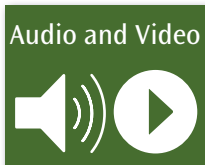
Association Between ADHD and Obesity: A Systematic Review and Meta-Analysis

ADHD is consistently associated with obesity or excess weight, in both children and adults. Underlying mechanisms are not known, but the association is not found in patients receiving medication for ADHD.

Revisit the field's rich history!

50 years ago this month: “Television Evidence in Court”

Psychiatrist James H. Ryan and attorney Vito J. Cassan report on the legal precedent set when “a video tape recording of a diagnostic interview was presented for the first time in a court of law during a mental incompetency proceeding,” and they discuss some of the ramifications.

25 years ago this month: “The Déjà Vu Experience: Remembrance of Things Past?”

Drs. Herman N. Sno and Don H. Linszen note that “the déjà vu experience is a common phenomenon, occurring in pathological as well as nonpathological conditions. It has been defined as any subjectively inappropriate impression of familiarity of a present experience with an undefined past. [They] discuss the epidemiologic data, clinical features, and etiology of the phenomenon of déjà vu. They also review the different hypotheses on the psychopathogenesis of the déjà vu experience and introduce an explanation based on the hologram as a mnemonic model.”
